

Investment in SK points to a bright future

here is much to celebrate in and around South Kesteven, and even more to look forward to.

In this issue of SKToday, you can catch up on town centre regeneration about to start in Grantham to restore the former Corn Exchange, Westgate Hall, and read about improvements to the Market Place. We are also gearing up for a transformation of Station Approach, the all-important gateway to this historic town.

These positive developments are made possible by successful bids for Government grants, which we are using to make improvements that will touch so many people's lives.

In addition, South Kesteven has made a bid for almost £3.9m from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund to meet three priorities: communities; pride in place; and to increase people's life chances. This will help develop local business, people and skills.

Our officers and elected Members are working hard to identify projects to match the themes of Communities, Health and Wellbeing; Environment and Infrastructure; Culture, Arts and Heritage; Enterprise, Innovation and Growth; Employability and Skills.

at more detailed ideas about how to make best use of the money, based on local need.

In Stamford, work continues at St Martin's Park, led by SKDC in partnership with Burghley Estates. I am proud that this ambitious project, which we know will bring significant benefits to the town and wider area, providing jobs and new homes, is shortlisted for the Environment Analyst Brownfield Awards 2022 as a great example of public sector work.

Looking forward, we now begin building a draft Budget for SKDC for 2023/24 and beyond, in the

face of the ever-increasing costs in delivering more than 100 services to residents across 365 square miles of South Kesteven.

This will support our priorities around growth and our economy; housing to meet the needs of all residents; sustaining healthy and strong communities; providing a clean and sustainable environment; and remaining a high-performing Council.

It will also meet our collective ambitions for SKDC to be in the best shape possible to make a positive impact on everyone's day-to-day lives while also providing the right support for those with the biggest and most urgent need across the district.

Parks score with Green Flag hat-trick

All three of South Kesteven **District Council's public** parks in Grantham have been rated among the best in the country.

yndham Park, Queen Elizabeth Park and Dysart Park - all managed by SKDC - have each been awarded coveted Green Flag status in the same year for the first time.

It is the first Green Flag Award for Dysart Park, while Queen Elizabeth has maintained the standard for a second year.

SKDC is committed to improving its parks and open spaces through a pledge to maintain a clean and sustainable environment for residents and visitors alike.

Cabinet Member for Culture and Visitor Economy, Cllr Rosemary Trollope-Bellew, said: "These awards celebrate the hard work and dedication of everyone involved in looking after the parks, including the many volunteers who contribute so much.

"Green Flag status is a mark of excellence and only goes to the best in the country, so for all three of Grantham's parks to have made the grade in

the same year is a fantastic achievement."

SKDC's Cabinet member for People and Safer Communities, Cllr Annie Mason, said: "Our parks are extremely popular and so important for our mental wellbeing. These awards are an acknowledgement of all the hard work that goes into maintaining them including the hard work by EnvironmentSK."

The Dysart Park site was given to the people of Grantham in 1908 by Sir Lionel William John Manners, late Earl of Dysart. In his will he said the land should be used for recreation purposes onlv.

The 25-acre Queen Elizabeth Park was established in 1980 to mark the 80th birthday of Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother.



For all three of Grantham's parks to have made the grade in the same year is a fantastic achievement.

Wyndham Park, where a £1m restoration to its former glory as a World War One memorial park was completed in 2018, receives its 11th consecutive award and has also retained Green Heritage Site accreditation for a third year for its historic features.

The Green Flag scheme, managed by Keep Britain Tidy, sets the benchmark for the management of recreational outdoor space in the UK and around the world.

Wellbeing map points to better mental health

ourne has a new 'Map of Opportunities' to help improve residents' mental health and wellbeing.

It aims to to reduce isolation and loneliness by listing charities, organisations, activities and places to go to for fun and company.

Research was conducted by mental health, wellbeing and counselling charity Don't Lose Hope, with design by community arts organisation Art Pop Up. South Kesteven District Council helped secure project funding.

Cllr Annie Mason, SKDC Cabinet Member for People and Safer Communities and the Council's Mental Health Chairman. said: "We have been delighted to support the development of another valuable community resource and we are very grateful

to Don't Lose Hope for such detailed research."

Face-to-face and online research found that 400 new activities were started during the pandemic.

It is also already yielding benefits with 60% of respondents put in touch with groups, and a new Monday group now welcoming young people with special needs to the Don't Lose Hope community garden and shed.

Best Kept Village winners for 2022

opsley and Welby have taken top honours in this year's SKDC Best Kept Village competition.

Allington was judged second in the large village category, with Barrowby third. Stubton took second place in the small village awards with Witham on the Hill third.

The winning villages will each receive £400 and a gold-coloured litter bin in recognition of residents' work and community spirit, with £300 for the runners-up and £200 for those in third place. The top two villages will also receive a gold coloured litter bin.

The two categories in the competition are large villages with 501-5,000 residents and small villages with populations between 100-500 residents.



Government grants spark town centre regeneration

Schemes include an updated Market Place, improvements to the station approach and renovations to historic Westgate Hall.

mprovements to Grantham town centre are starting to take shape - thanks to a series of Government grants aimed at specific regeneration proposals.

Under the Future High Streets (FHS) programme, SKDC is getting ready to transform the access gateway into the town from the railway station, as well as investing in the Market Place, creating open space for the whole community.

The historic Grade II listed Westgate Hall (above and top right) will be transformed into a high end new restaurant with work funded by the Grantham Heritage Action Zone programme, through Historic England and South Kesteven District Council.

SKDC Leader Cllr Kelham Cooke said: "Our FHS programme presents a unique opportunity to deliver on SKDC's ambition for the next phase of Grantham's growth.

"This is an example of SKDC securing investment for infrastructure to support this ongoing and sustainable growth."

Grantham received £5.56 million of FHS funding to deliver infrastructure projects in the town, along with an additional £379,000 from SKDC.

Meanwhile, a £300,000 grant for Westgate Hall will cover urgent repairs and necessary improvements to bring the former corn exchange, which dates from 1852, back into use.

The remaining repair costs will be funded by the property owner, while the new tenant will support by financing new décor, fixtures and fittings. The former nighclub has been empty for five years.

Restaurateur Ade Adeshina aims to create a new destination eatery along the lines of his successful fine dining restaurant The Chubby Castor, near Peterborough.

Cllr Cooke said: "We can't turn back the clock on how the building has deteriorated over the years, but it is recognised as a landmark building in the town, and we are fortunate to be in a position to help address what needs doing.

"SKDC has a vision to be the best district in which to live, work and visit and as we deliver on those priorities, residents and businesses can expect to benefit from continued growth."

High spec homes offer sustainable living that can last a lifetime

SKDC is working to meet the District's future housing demand with innovative new developments.

enants have moved into the latest high quality, sustainable, social housing provided by SKDC.

The five bungalows at Trinity Road, Stamford, comprise a onebedroom and a three-bedroom property, with three two-bedroom properties.

They were built by SKDC to provide accommodation for people on the Housing Register - the people most in need of a home.

Cabinet Member for Housing and Property, Cllr Robert Reid, said: "Our ongoing programme of house building will ultimately help prevent homelessness and overcrowding by providing some of the new homes that are so badly needed across the district.

"This latest development in Stamford supports a recently completed scheme in Bourne."

SKDC Leader Cllr Kelham Cooke said: "By building new homes ourselves, we can focus



on particular needs such as accessible homes and helping to meet a growing demand for affordable housing.

"This is a key ambition of our Corporate Plan and there is more on the way."

The next major site for development will be at Swinegate in Grantham.

The 20-unit sheltered housing scheme in the town centre will be a flagship development for technology and material standards.

At Trinity Road, for instance, modern building methods have been used that exceed industry standards for construction

time, ensuring the homes are delivered more quickly, with enhanced energy performance and to meet the lifestyle choices of the tenant.

They also feature measures to ensure housing is highly energy efficient to reduce energy consumption, helping the future tenants save on their energy bills.

Three of the properties have been built with full disability access and all are built to Lifetime Home standard, which means they can be easily altered to support a range of mobility requirements.







Boost for business from special offers phone app

SKDC links up with award-winning tech firm to launch free app to celebrate and support diverse local business, from retailers to visitor sites and arts centres.

esidents of South Kesteven are making the most of local shops, traders and attractions thanks to a new app bringing businesses closer to their community.

Launched by SKDC, HelloSK showcases small and independent businesses from all parts of the district, connecting them with the people that live and work here - and giving a platform to promote their service.

The app was officially launched last month and residents have been quick to download the app connecting with more than 100 businesses and attractions already signed up.

The app is free to download and use either as a resident or a business. By using GPS technology, it alerts users to what's nearby and can even highlight exclusive offers, meaning members will never miss out on a good deal.

It has been a difficult time for

traders across the area with many still suffering as a result of the Covid-19 pandemic.

SKDC understands that growing the local economy is vital and is committed to supporting businesses to bounce back.

"It hopes the investment in the app will boost business and help to revitalise the high streets.

SKDC Leader Cllr Kelham Cooke said: "Supporting our business community is a key priority in our Corporate Plan and this is an exciting new way of providing even more support for businesses across the district and encouraging residents to shop locally.

"Through this investment, we hope to see our local economy grow more sustainable and stronger than ever as well as create communities that can thrive."

The Council partnered awardwinning technology company Bubltown to develop the app after receiving vital funding through the Government's Welcome Back Fund via the European Regional Development Fund in 2020.

A share of £56m was split across councils in England to support the return of high streets and visitors and aid recovery after the pandemic.

Cllr Cooke said: "Residents value their high streets. However, the pandemic presented huge challenges for local businesses and this project will help their recovery.

"It will allow all South Kesteven businesses, no matter which sector they operate in, to create a profile free of charge and promote their business directly to thousands of South Kesteven residents.

"There are some fantastic businesses in our District and the app is another incentive for people to shop local and take advantage of what they have to offer."

Council strikes gold with support for military

outh Kesteven District Council has been awarded a prestigious military honour - the Defence Employers Recognition Scheme Gold Award.

To gain the coveted award, the Council had to illustrate exceptional levels of advocacy and support for the Armed Forces.

Letters of congratulation have been received from the, Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State and Minister for Defence People and Veterans Leo Docherty, and the Lord Lieutenant of Lincolnshire, Toby Dennis.

The selection procedure was rigorous and conducted at the highest level within the Ministry of Defence and Cabinet Office.

It recognised how SKDC worked to raise awareness of defence and encouraged others to do the same.

This included celebration of. and investment in, local military heritage; support for the military at evets such as Remembrance

and flag-raising ceremonies; and engagement with the local Army Training Regiment at Prince William of Gloucester Barracks.

SKDC is now one of 12 Gold Award holders in Lincolnshire amongst just 643 in the entire country.

One of the council's stated commitments at its recent signing of the Armed Forces Community Covenant was to encourage others to sign the Covenant and engage in the Employer Recognition Scheme.

Arnhem heritage trail explored

The potential for a military heritage trail to illustrate the local build-up to the Battle of Arnhem in September 1944 is being explored.

Military specialists and veterans are working with SKDC to map key sites to illustrate a largely untold story - paratroopers of the First Airborne Division trained locally for the Arnhem airborne assault immortalised in the film, A Bridge Too Far.

Research will also include the contribution of the United States Army Air Force 9th Troop Carrier Command carrying troops to Europe from airfields across the district, notably RAF Barkston Heath.

There is also relevance for Stamford, where the 1st Polish Independent Parachute Brigade had its HQ at Rock House and left for Arnhem from RAF Saltby.

A warm welcome for Ukrainian evacuees

amilies across South Kesteven have opened their homes and their hearts to welcome Ukrainian evacuees, providing a safe place for them to stay.

Organisations have also ensured that families can meet up, hosting events and fund-raising activities to help humanitarian causes.

Ukrainian evacuees from The Deepings had a great day out at Hunstanton thanks to a £2,000 grant from The Rotary Club of The Deepings.

Cllr Judy Stevens helped organise the trip to the seaside and Cllr Phil Dilks and Round Table Chairman Simon Bateman drove minibuses, accompanied by a translator.

Grantham's Jubilee Church, which supports evacuees and teaches English, hosted over 100 adults and 25 children, many with their host families, at a celebration of Ukraine.

A video showed the country before and during the war, and there was dancing, songs and a spread of typical Ukrainian cuisine.

Stamford Diversity Group has also gone all out to support families and raise funds. A Peace Walk attracted 100 people. fund-raising has secured more than £2,000 for the Ukraine Humanitarian Appeal - including an auction supported by Cllrs Amanda Wheeler and Richard Cleaver – and there are many more ideas in the pipeline.

Hosts and guests were treated to an evening of food and entertainment at Stamford College. Volunteers also

teach English and help with accommodation, CVs and interviews, skills workshops, walking groups and sourcing donations of clothes, bikes, laptops and phones.

South Kesteven has received more requests for accommodation than any other district in Lincolnshire and SKDC has carried out well over 140 accommodation checks on suitability and to collect information to support safeguarding checks.

Who does what? A brief guide to services provided by your Councils

t can be confusing trying to work out which council is best to contact if you have a question or an issue to report. When it comes to who does what it's not about passing the buck, it's about taking responsibility.

Your Council Tax pays for services divided across three tiers of Local Government - Lincolnshire County Council, South Kesteven District Council and your parish or town council. Here is just a snapshot of the services provided 2021/22.

Charity cycle trek checks in

ntrepid cyclists who completed the 400-mile G2P 2022 trip from Grantham to Paris to raise money for charity within 40 hours.

Despite ten punctures, a 2.5hr ferry delay, and three substitute bikes being needed, they were on the road for 25 hours, and have raised more than £9,000.

South Kesteven Markets Supervisor Gary Taylor was part of the 24-strong team for the trek which proved to be a challenge in many ways.

He said: "What an epic ride and adventure! Over 401 miles in the saddle in all weathers from rain, winds, and extreme heat - making it by far the hardest challenge that I have endured on a bike.

"Team camaraderie and support throughout was absolutely amazing and this continued while having some well-earned R&R in Paris after the challenge.

"The highlight for me was watching the final stage of the Tour De France on the Avenue des Champs-Élysées.

"Our challenge makes for



some amazing memories for all the fantastic people who helped raise money for eight local charities."

lected Members of South Kesteven District Council play a key role in serving residents across the District. Depending where they live, residents are represented by one, two or sometimes three councillors.


Often the first point of contact in their communities, our councillors offer advice and can raise issues of concern within council debate and the decision-making processes.



Don't put batteries in your bin!

Instead of throwing batteries in the bin, there are other ways to dispose of them that are safe, reduce the risk of fires - and are better for the environment.

o keep bin crews and refuse centre workers safe, residents are being urged to keep old batteries out of their bins and dispose of old batteries in dedicated battery bins provided by retailers or at their local household waste recycling centre.

This also applies to household items containing batteries, or rechargeable items such as shavers.

Lincolnshire County Council's Household Waste Recycling Centres are fully open and details of locations and opening hours can be found at



https://bit.ly/LincsRecycle

It follows a series of bin lorry fires around Lincolnshire. all caused by batteries igniting when compacted in the freighters.

Cllr Mark Whittington, SKDC Cabinet Member for Waste Services, said: "A single spark can easily ignite the lithium they contain, leading to a fire.

"Batteries, chargers, old mobile phones, vape pens and other small devices should not be placed in bins. They need to be

disposed of separately because of this inherent risk."

All batteries - AA and AAA alkaline varieties - and electrical items need to be correctly disposed of at the appropriate recycling facility.

Electricals containing batteries that tend to be discarded the most are smaller, frequently used and often cheaper items like toothbrushes, shavers, chargers and tovs. If batteries cannot be removed, then electricals should always be recycled separately.

£3.9m fund offers 'fantastic opportunity'

outh Kesteven District Council has submitted its investment plan to the Government, setting out how it hopes to spend the District's allocation from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund. (UKSPF).

A total of almost £3.9 million has been set aside for South Kesteven but in order to access the money, along with other councils nationally, SKDC has had to identify activities that will be right for the area and then seek Government approval.

The UKSPF is the

Government's replacement for EU funding following the UK's withdrawal from the European Union.

It will be used to build pride in place and increase people's life chances. More than £2.6 billion has been awarded across the country. Spending will be based on five themes:

- Communities, health and wellbeing
- Environment and infrastructure
- Culture, arts and heritage
- Employability and skills

 Enterprise, innovation and growth

The Council will now work to identify projects that best match the five themes. SKDC Leader Cllr Kelham Cooke, said: "This is a fantastic opportunity to secure substantial investment for the District and support positive projects in communities throughout South Kesteven."

The Government is expected to make the first payments to councils in October 2022 after reviewing submitted plans.

he re-opening of Stamford Arts Centre post-pandemic has been a real success story - with audiences returning in their hundreds, the sold-out signs going up for many events.

A live recording of Gardeners' Question Time for BBC Radio 4 in June, and a satellite screening of National Theatre Live's Prima Facie starring Jodie Comer at the Harold Pinter Theatre proved to be the biggest attractions.


